Making a nomination

What Awards will be made?

- **Human Rights Lawyer of the year**
 - for solicitors, barristers, legal executives, trainees, pupils, legal academics and judges.
- **The Human Rights Award**
 - for organisations and non-legal individuals.
- **The Peter Duffy* Award**
 - for individuals (campaigners, lawyers, activists, academics etc) aged 35 or under.

Who is eligible?

- Nominees will have made a significant contribution to the promotion or protection of human rights in England and Wales over the last year.
- Nominations may be based on a specific campaign or case that has come to fruition in 2007 or general sustained work.
- The judges will favour nominees whose work exceeds their professional commitments.

How do I nominate?

- Nominations open on Monday 1 October 2007.
- Nominations should be emailed to nominations@liberty-human-rights.org.uk by 5pm on Monday 12 November 2007.
- Nominations must include the full name and contact details of both the nominee and the nominator. They must be supported by a statement not exceeding 400 words, explaining the nominee's eligibility for the award.
- Nominations may be made by any organisation, group or individual. Self nomination is not permitted.
- Employees or other office-holders at Liberty and JUSTICE are not eligible for nomination.

*The Peter Duffy Award commemorates the life and achievements of one of the UK's most highly dedicated human rights lawyers. Peter Duffy QC was particularly supportive of younger lawyers, giving freely of his time and skills. An important part of his human rights work was done pro bono for organisations, including Liberty and JUSTICE.
