Jodie Blackstock is a barrister and the senior legal officer for EU (Criminal Justice and Home Affairs) at JUSTICE. Before joining JUSTICE, Jodie practiced at 1 Crown Office Row Chambers. She also holds the Caribbean Legal Education Certificate and regularly assists on Trinidadian constitutional cases. In addition to her role at JUSTICE she sits on the executive committee of Amicus (assisting lawyers for justice on death row) with responsibility for casework.

Richard de Friend is a member of the College of Law's Management Board with responsibility for academic standards and quality, and the Careers and Pro Bono Services. He is also Director of its London Bloomsbury Centre. Before joining the College in 1998 he worked at the University of Kent where having taught Public Law, he became Head of the Kent Law School, and then a Pro Vice Chancellor. He has been a governor of two Colleges, Kent Institute of Art and Design and the University College for the Creative Arts; and has held non-executive positions with the Public Law Project; and Pro Bono Net UK. He was a member of the Attorney General's Pro Bono Committee and is a member of JUSTICE's Council.

Patrick Doris is a senior associate in the London office of Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer. Patrick specialises in human rights law, public law and administrative law, EU law and regulatory matters. In recent years, Patrick has been heavily involved in advising governments, regulators and public bodies in securing compliance with their EU, human rights and general public law obligations. Patrick also has an active pro bono human rights practice, acting for NGOs and private individuals before the European Court of Human Rights and in domestic courts.

Tom Hickman is a barrister at Blackstone Chambers where he specialises in public law, human rights and EU law. He was called to the Bar in 2003 and has acted for JUSTICE in several recent third party interventions in the House of Lords, including the 2007 control order appeals (*MB v Secretary of State for the Home Department*) and the recent intervention in *OO (Jordan), RB & U (Algeria) v Secretary of State for the Home Department*. He is the co-author of *Human Rights: Judicial Protection in the UK* (Sweet & Maxwell).

Sally Ireland is Senior Legal Officer (Criminal Justice) at JUSTICE. Prior to joining JUSTICE she practised as a barrister at the (then) Chambers of Peter Rook QC, 18 Red Lion Court. She. In addition to her role at JUSTICE she is the current Deputy Chair of the Standing Committee for Youth Justice, and an editorial board member of the Journal of Criminal Law. She is also the legislation editor for the Journal of Criminal Law and holds an LLM in Human Rights Law from LSE.

Baroness Helena Kennedy QC is a barrister and the chair of JUSTICE Council. She practices predominantly in the criminal law, undertaking leading work of all kinds. She also undertakes judicial review, public inquiries and sex discrimination work. She has acted in many of the prominent cases of the last decade including the Brighton Bombing Trial, Guildford Four Appeal, the bombing of the Israeli Embassy, the abduction of Baby Abbie Humphries and a number of key domestic violence cases. She is currently acting in cases connected to the recent wave of terrorism. She is the former Chair of the Human Genetics Commission and stepped down as Chair of the British Council in July 2004 after completing six years. She is the Chair of Arts and Business, a Bencher of Gray's Inn and a Member of the House of Lords speaking on issues of human rights and civil liberties. A frequent broadcaster and journalist on law and women's rights; her publications include the widely acclaimed *Eve Was Framed: Women and British Justice* (Vintage, 1993) which has been fully updated and has been reissued in paperback, March 2005.

Dr Eric Metcalfe is a barrister and the director of human rights policy at JUSTICE. He completed his D.Phil in law at the University of Oxford and was called to the Bar in 1999. Following work as a researcher at the Law Commission and pupillage at 39 Essex Street, he was a lawyer in the immigration and judicial review team of the Treasury Solicitor's Department before joining JUSTICE in 2003. He also manages JUSTICE's third party interventions, most recently *AE, AF and AN v Secretary of State for the Home Department* in the House of Lords in March 2009.

Clarissa O'Callaghan is global head of Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer's pro bono programme. The pro bono programme is core part of the firm's CSR activities and focuses on human rights, access to justice, homelessness and disadvantaged young people. Clarissa is a practising solicitor, having qualified into Freshfield's litigation department in 2004 and has worked on cases before the European Court of Human Rights and on death penalty and clemency cases in the US. She sits on the executive committee of the Human Rights Lawyers Association.

Roger Smith is a solicitor and has been director of JUSTICE since November 2001. He has been director of legal education and training at the Law Society; director of the Legal Action Group; solicitor to the Child Poverty Action Group and director of West Hampstead Community Law Centre.
